

Dear Friends

Grace and peace to you in the name of our risen Lord Jesus Christ.

We find ourselves now in that beautiful, reflective stretch of the Church calendar between the glory of Easter and the fire of Pentecost. It's a season that can sometimes be overlooked - a kind of spiritual "in-between" - yet it holds deep significance for our faith and our discipleship.



On Easter Sunday, we stood together in joy, proclaiming, "Alleluia! Christ is risen! He is risen indeed!" We sang our hymns of triumph and hope, remembering again that the tomb is empty, and death has been defeated. But what happens after the alleluias fade and the lilies begin to wilt?

This is where the story deepens.

In the forty days following the Resurrection, the Gospels tell us that Jesus appeared to His disciples numerous times. He walked beside them on the road to Emmaus, cooked breakfast on the shore, showed His wounds to Thomas, and opened the Scriptures to their hearts. These were not just postscript moments - they were formational. Jesus was preparing His followers for what came next: not just believing in the Resurrection, but living it.

So too are we being invited in this season to sit with the Risen Christ and to be transformed by His presence. Just as the disciples were called from fear into faith, from hiding into witness, so are we.

This time between Easter and Pentecost is one of both waiting and preparation. In Acts 1 we hear Jesus instruct the disciples to "wait for the promise of the Father" - the coming of the Holy Spirit. They didn't know exactly what was coming, only that they would be "clothed with power from on high." But they trusted. And they gathered. They prayed. They watched.



What a timely message that is for us in today's world. We too are often caught in times of waiting - waiting for clarity, for war to end and for peace, for healing, for direction. We don't always have all the answers, nor do we see the full picture of what God is doing. But in the waiting, we are called to remain faithful. Like those first disciples, we gather in prayer and in hope, trusting that God will act in God's time.

Here in our parish we are being called to discern afresh who God is inviting us to be and how He is calling us to serve. This is why we've begun the prayerful process of discerning our vision and values. At the very heart of it all is a simple, powerful truth: we are called to love Jesus, love one another, and love our community.



This isn't just a motto - it's a movement of the heart. As we listen for God's voice together, I encourage you to take part in the conversations, share your hopes and prayers, and keep our parish in your own prayers. This vision will shape how we worship, serve, and grow together in the months and years ahead.

At the core of this vision is discipleship - our daily journey of following Jesus. Discipleship isn't just for a few, or for those in leadership—it is the calling of every Christian. It asks of us a heart of generosity: to offer our time, our gifts, and our resources in service of God and one another. Whether it's volunteering in a ministry, giving financially to support the church's mission, or simply being present and prayerful, every act of generosity builds up the Body of Christ and allows us to become a community that reflects God's Kingdom.

We see signs of this already in action. At St John's, our Pews to Chairs Project continues with care and purpose: not just changing furniture, but reimagining how we use our sacred space to better welcome and gather. Our Church Hall, too, is to undergo important improvements, so it can continue to be a place of life and connection at the heart of our community.

At St Boniface, we give thanks for the steady progress in the fabric work: the faithful, behind-the-scenes, efforts to ensure our church remains a beautiful, safe, and spiritually resonant space for generations to come.

All these efforts are part of the bigger picture of resurrection life. We are not simply maintaining buildings - we are creating places where people can encounter God, experience belonging, and find purpose.



Let us not rush past this season. Let us not skip from the empty tomb to the tongues of fire without pausing to let our hearts burn within us, like the disciples on the Emmaus Road. Let's take time to notice where Jesus is walking beside us, perhaps unnoticed at first, and allow Him to reveal Himself anew.

"...you will receive power when the Holy Spirit has come upon you; and you will be my witnesses... to the ends of the earth." (Acts 1:8 NRSVA)

May this Eastertide be for you a sacred season of growth and grace. May your heart be open to the Spirit's whisper. And may we, as a community, be ready to receive again the power and purpose that Pentecost brings.

Highlights from the PCC Meeting (Weds 19th March 2025)

Pews to Chairs

The Chancellor has granted our Faculty request to replace the pews with chairs, subject to the conditions that 'we take reasonable steps to use the timber from the pews in the church', and 'the replacement chairs are solely wooden'.

Safeguarding

The Safeguarding Policy for our Parish was approved by the PCC. Copies are displayed at both our churches.

Electoral Roll

All those on the Electoral Roll are viewed as committed members of our two churches, and not just a means of participating in the APCM.

Finance

The Annual Report and Accounts for the year ended 31st December 2024, were adopted, ahead of the APCM on 30th April 2025.

Quinquennial Report

There are a number of items needing repair in the next five years, the most significant being the re-shingling of the Tower.

- Men's Shed Draft Agreement

Work is in progress on the wording of the new Agreement covering the use of St Boniface Church Hall by the Men's Shed.

Permission to Officiate

Steve Beak has offered to apply to the Diocese for Permission to Officiate in our Parish, which would allow him to conduct funerals, weddings, baptisms and Holy Communion. Steve would not be a second vicar, rather another pair of hands to enhance what our two churches can offer.

The tremendous amount of work Ewan Brown had done to create the new website was given due recognition and thanks. The website is very much a work in progress but a vast improvement on the old one.

Pilgrim Passport Cathedral Tour

Following my 'Peregrines' article in November's Twin Spires News magazine, the second leg of my 'Pilgrim Passport' cathedral tour took me to East Anglia, where I visited Bury St. Edmunds and Norwich.



Norwich Cathedral contains this plaque in remembrance of Thomas Fowell Buxton MP, who became one of the leaders of the abolitionist movement after the death of his friend William Wilberforce.



Someone who would have known Buxton, was Samuel Wilks, a name some of you may recognise from reading it on the wall of St. Boniface Church, where he was Rector from 1847 until his death in 1872. Like Buxton, he had close links to Wilberforce and other abolitionists. In 1816, he became editor of the Evangelical newspaper Christian Observer, a post he held for over 30 years. In 1830 he preached a sermon which was later published as 'The duty of prompt and complete abolition of slavery'. In it, he complained about Christians who owned slaves and questioned how they could believe they were happy and well-treated. He contrasted Paul's treatment of Onesimus in the book of Philemon with white colonials in a system he believed had to be 'exterminated'.

Many people today have questioned Paul's stance on slavery in Philemon, however it is essential to look at the context. Paul clearly wanted Onesimus to be freed, as he hoped he would help him in his work. Various commentators explain that slavery was the bedrock of the Roman economy and could not easily be ended. In addition, Paul and the early Christians were not in a position of strength politically to be able to make any changes. It took nearly 1800 years, but finally, a group of Christians, including one who later came to Nursling, used their social and political positions to do what Paul would have liked to have done.

Thank you so much to all the kind folk who gave up their time on this sunny spring morning to litter pick. A shout out to newbies Claire, Janet, Natalie, April and Sophia. Spring (and the pollen!) was in the air and I counted 15 litter pickers in total, which is fantastic.

We fanned out from the Old Post office starting point, always in twos or more. We found the usual discarded bits of food packaging, drinks cans, glass and cigarette butts. However, Natalie and her children spotted a large, abandoned heavy bag in amongst some brambles. I advised them against trying to get it out for safety reasons. They also then found a fly tipped fire extinguisher. I took photos and will notify my contact at Test Valley Council.

In total, we collected 5 large bags of general waste and 3 bags of recyclables. A big thank you to Cath (Village News editor) for taking a lot of the recyclable glass and plastics and taking them to the bottle bank and into her own brown bin. The 5 bags of general waste were stickered up and gathered together by the Horns Drove road sign.

Green Tips

Did you know there is an organisation that encourages recycling rather than sending things to landfill? It works via the internet.



There are a few rules, the main one being that you cannot ask for any money. You can post a message on their 'notice board' with the details of the item you are offering and your approximate location, (eq Nursling).

If someone is interested you will receive an email from them via the freecycle website so they and you can arrange a mutually convenient time for them to collect the item.

For more details and to join the scheme, go to https://www.freecycle.org/ and 'join' your local 'towns' ie Romsey and/or Southampton.

You can then choose to get notified whenever someone posts (which means you will receive a lot of mail!) to get a 'digest' of the posts each day, or not to receive notifications at all.

Among other things, we have used it to find homes for a caravan step, an umbrella stand and some bath taps We have gained some good quality pillows and a blender.

Recycling the items below via St John's Church mini-recycling centre can generate funds for various charities:



- used postage stamps, ideally with a 1cm margin
- old spectacles, (not cases or contact lenses).
- used printer cartridges and new unopened printer cartridges (not laser or toner cartridges)

We are no longer able to recycle used plastic pens and felt tips. And, for the time being, we cannot accept milk bottle tops. However Test Valley will now accept bottle tops in your kerbside recycling bin, if they are put back on the plastic bottle after it has been squashed.



Thanks to everyone who helps us recycle. The ink cartridge recycling not only means that waste is kept out of landfill, but it also raises money for our churches. The last batch sent off raised £19.50. So far, we have raised about £460 since we started collecting them.



Barnabas – a Very Likeable Disciple

This month we remember St Barnabas, whose real name was Joseph, a wealthy Levite from Cyprus. However, he was better known by his nickname which means 'Son of Encouragement' (Acts 4:36). Throughout Acts we see him encouraging others in different ways.

Barnabas showed generous giving (Acts 4:36-7), when he sold property and offered the money to the church for those in need. In the midst of a caring, sharing community, he was singled out as a symbol of generosity. Are we known as somebody who is generous to those in need around us?

Barnabas later encouraged a new Christian in the person of Paul (Acts 9:27). After Paul's conversion and knowing his reputation, Barnabas came alongside him and brought him into the fellowship of the church. Are we ready to help those who are new in the faith to find a place in our church?

Finally, Barnabas was sent to the church in Antioch where he 'saw the evidence of the grace of God' (Acts 11:23). It was a church which brought Jewish and Gentile believers together for the first time. Like Barnabas, do we rejoice when we see God doing new things in people's lives? Are we also willing to embrace these things and facilitate change?

Encouragement is one of the spiritual gifts in the New Testament (Romans 12:8). It can be undervalued, but is crucial in growing the church. Like Barnabas, will we nurture gifting; strengthen the doubters and those tempted to give up; show generosity to God's people and beyond the church; strengthen people to move beyond their comfort zones to help others in need?

Let's be prepared to ask the following questions: 'Are there people alongside us who will encourage us?' and 'How can we be encouragers to others?'

News from Blue Lamp Trust

So far, the Trust have visited more than 130 Rias customers in Hampshire and the Isle of Wight and, as well as installing the Ring video doorbells, have also carried a free crime and fire prevention survey at the property.

Ageas are now donating a stock of Ring video doorbells to the Trust to be used to support vulnerable residents in the community This is a real help, especially where The Blue Lamp Trust receives requests that they cannot fulfil due to cost implications. Ring video doorbells can be a great deterrent but can also be used to gain evidence in cases of domestic abuse or anti-social behaviour.

Blue Lamp Trust Breakfast Event

In April the Blue Lamp Trust hosted a successful 'Meet the Chiefs' Breakfast at the Utilita Bowl in Southampton, bringing together community leaders, local charities and support services to highlight the vital work of the Trust in supporting vulnerable residents across Hampshire and the Isle of Wight.

Attendees heard from Chief Fire Officer Neil Odin and Acting Chief Constable Sam de Reya, who both reaffirmed their organisations' continued commitment to the work of the Trust and its services – the Bobby Scheme and Cyber Bobby Scheme.

They spoke about the importance of prevention and how the Bobby Scheme assistance in delivering 'Fire Safe and Well' visits is helping them to reach vulnerable people in our community, raising awareness of the risks in the home and how they can protect themselves. Smoke alarms alone are not enough, education is essential, and the Bobby Scheme Safety Technicians are a crucial part of this. They talked of the police's commitment to putting victims first and providing local policing, and how the Bobby Scheme and Cyber Bobby Schemes both support this by providing further support to victims of crime and also preventative work to help people avoid crimes occurring.

The focus of the morning was to raise awareness of the support provided by the Blue Lamp Trusts schemes.. The more people that know about us, the more people we can help"

In 2024 alone, the Bobby Scheme – which offers free home safety and security visits – supported over 2,800 households, with 91% of clients reporting that they felt safer afterwards. Meanwhile, demand continues to grow for the Cyber Bobby Scheme, which delivers crucial online safety advice to help residents guard against cyber-enabled crime.

Ascension Day: 40 Days with the Risen Christ

40 days after Easter comes Ascension Day. These are the 40 days during which the Risen Christ appeared again and again to His disciples, following His death and resurrection. (*Matthew 28; Mark 16; Luke 24; John 20.*)



The Gospels give us little of Christ's teachings and deeds during those 40 days. Jesus was seen by numerous of His disciples: on the road to Emmaus, by the Sea of Galilee, in houses, etc. He strengthened and encouraged His disciples, and at last opened their eyes to all that the Scriptures had promised about the Messiah. Jesus also told them that as the Father had sent Him, He was now going to send them – to all corners of the earth, as His witnesses.

Surely the most tender, moving 'farewell' in history took place on Ascension Day. Luke records the story with great poignancy. "When Jesus had led them out to the vicinity of Bethany, He lifted up His hands – and blessed them."

As Christmas began the story of Jesus' life on earth, so Ascension Day completes it, with His return to His Father in heaven. Jesus' last act on earth was to bless His disciples. He and they had a bond as close as could be: they had just lived through three tumultuous years of public ministry and miracles – persecution and death – and resurrection! Just as we part from our nearest and dearest by still looking at them with love and memories in our eyes, so exactly did Jesus: 'While He was blessing them, He left them and was taken up into heaven.' (Luke 24:50-1) He was not forsaking them, but merely going on ahead to a kingdom which would also be theirs one day: 'I am ascending to my Father and to your Father, to my God and your God...' (John 20:17)

The disciples were surely the most favoured folk in history. Imagine being one of the last few people on earth to be face to face with Jesus, and have Him look on you with love. No wonder then that Luke goes on: 'they worshipped Him – and returned to Jerusalem with great joy. And they stayed continually at the temple, praising God.' (Luke 24:52,53)

No wonder they praised God! They knew they would see Jesus again one day! 'I am going to prepare a place for you... I will come back and take you to be with me that you also may be where I am.' (John 14:2,3) In the meantime, Jesus had work for them to do: to take the Gospel to every nation on earth.
