


# Verse of the Month

...The fruit of the Spirit is love, joy, peace, patience, kindness, generosity, faithfulness, gentleness, and self-control. (Galatians 5:22-23 NRSVA)



Dear Friends,

As the days lengthen and the weather warms up with sunnier skies, we find ourselves living in a very particular space in the Church calendar: the days between the Ascension and Pentecost. Jesus has risen from the grave. He has appeared to His disciples, eaten with them, taught them, and then He ascended. It can feel like a pause in the story. But it's not a gap: it's a preparation. In this season between Ascension and Pentecost, the early disciples gathered in prayer, waiting for the Spirit. They weren't just standing still - they were preparing their hearts.

So, let me gently ask: How are you preparing your heart in this season?

Discipleship is not about perfection - it's about direction. Are we moving closer to Jesus? Are we growing in trust, in prayer, in courage? Whether you've been following Jesus for decades or are just beginning to explore faith, there's a next step for you. Maybe it's joining a home group. Maybe it's making space each day for quiet prayer. Maybe it's saying yes to serving in a new way. Discipleship is not a burden - it's a joyful journey with the one who knows us best and loves us most.

It's easy to think of the Ascension as a kind of farewell scene. Jesus disappears into the clouds, and we're left behind. But that's not what's really happening. The Ascension is not Jesus leaving us; it's Jesus lifting us. The risen Christ now sits at the right hand of the Father, yes, but He also promises to send the Holy Spirit. His presence is no longer limited by time or place. He is now with us always, even to the end of the age. And so,



rather than ending the story, the Ascension opens the next chapter, the Church's chapter. Our chapter: "You will be my witnesses," Jesus says. That calling hasn't changed. We are still His witnesses - here, now, in our families, our workplaces, our neighbourhoods, and our communities.

And what does it look like to be witnesses of Jesus today? It might look



like the person who leads a toddler group each week, offering welcome and warmth to tired parents and joyful children. It might be the youth leader encouraging a teenager who's questioning their place in the world. It might be the team preparing meals for Alpha, setting out chairs, washing up, or quietly praying for the person sitting two rows in front of them on Sunday. It might be you - and the way you listen, love, invite, or simply show up. Every act of service, every word of kindness, every cup of tea poured in Jesus' name is a sign of His kingdom breaking in.

We're especially excited to have launched our in-person Alpha course in May: something we've not done in a while. Alpha is such a beautiful ministry, because it's all about hospitality, listening, and community. There's food, of course - because so much of Jesus' ministry happened around the table. But more importantly, there's room. Room for questions, room for doubts, room for honest conversation and authentic friendship.

We've already seen how powerful it can be when someone feels heard and welcomed, perhaps for the first time in a church setting. Alpha is not about having all the answers. It's about making space. Please pray for our Alpha guests - and if you know someone who might be curious about faith, it's never too late to invite them along. You can always say: "Come and see."

Our children's and youth ministries continue to be a bright and joyful part of church life. From toddlers to teens, we see the Holy Spirit at work in young lives, shaping them with love, laughter, and truth. Thank you to everyone who gives time, energy, and prayer to support this work; it's not always easy, but it is deeply valuable. These young people are not just "the future of the Church" - they are the Church now. And every smile, story, and craft completed is part of the kingdom coming.

The days between Ascension and Pentecost remind us that we are a people living between two worlds: earth and heaven. Our feet are planted firmly in the everyday realities of life, but our hearts are lifted toward heaven's promise. And in that space, we are called to live with courage, with joy, and with purpose.



That's why it matters that we come to church. We don't gather just out of habit or obligation. We come to be formed, to be reminded of who God is, and who we are. We come to worship, to learn, to belong, and to be sent out again, renewed. Church is not an event we attend. It is a family we are part of. And in this fractured and lonely world, belonging matters more than ever.

So, let me ask again: What is your next step? Maybe it's supporting our next Alpha course. Maybe it's offering to serve once a month. Maybe it's attending regularly after a time away. Maybe it's praying daily for our young people or inviting a neighbour to church. Whatever it is, know this: You are not alone. Jesus goes ahead of you. The Spirit empowers you. And this church community is walking with you.

As we wait, like the first disciples, between Ascension and Pentecost, may we prepare not just events - but hearts. Hearts open to the Spirit. Hearts full of hope. Hearts ready to say yes again to the One who calls us friend.

Come, Holy Spirit. Fill your Church. Kindle in us the fire of your love.

#### Boniface Bike Ride: from Hook van Holland to Fulda, Germany

This summer, a small group of slightly intrepid cyclists from our parish – Andy Ball, Jacob Ball, Mike Bunce, and David Thompson – will embark on revisiting the most challenging leg of the Boniface rides from Hook van Holland to Fulda in Germany.

It was on this same journey in 2012 we heard the immortal line from the owner of our accommodation "If you go to Winterberg you will die," – referring to the need to cycle over a mountain to get to the next town on our journey.

Our journey will culminate at the cathedral in Fulda where St Boniface was laid to rest. St Boniface is the patron saint of Germany, who notably trained at the site of our very own St Boniface church.

Inspired by St Boniface's mission to share the Christian message, the group is cycling the 550 km ride raising funds for the Church Missionary Society (CMS), who like St Boniface, are dedicated to bringing the message of Christ to those who have yet to hear it.

CMS has had, and continues to have, a vital role in the world. Dear to the heart of many in our parish, not least Jim and Edith Stanley Smith who worked for CMS in Africa, as did Jim's parents. As a parish we have supported several missionaries in CMS too over the years.

For over 220 years, since its founding in Aldersgate Street, London, on April 12, 1799, CMS has been at the forefront of mission. Its early supporters included influential figures like William Wilberforce, John Venn, and John Newton, who together championed the abolition of the slave trade, fought for the rights of the oppressed, and bravely ventured overseas to share the Gospel.

Just as St Boniface fearlessly carried the Good news of Jesus Christ to various parts of Europe, CMS has a strong tradition of pioneering mission, reaching the unreached and adapting the Gospel expression to new situations and cultures both at home and abroad.

The need for mission remains as critical as ever, and CMS possesses the extensive experience and capability to effectively deliver it.

# We Need Your Help Again



Every year, during the second week of June, churches are encouraged to record the wildlife in their churchyards and report this to the National Biodiversity Network. Churchyards are often seen as a crucial haven for wildlife. This provides useful data on what is happening to wildlife and enables decisions to be made on what actions can best be taken to help recovery.

We would love your help in recording the animals and plants that inhabit St John's Churchyard. We hope this can be a fun activity for all the family.

If you would like to take part it would be really helpful if you first downloaded the iNaturalist App on your phone and then 'joined' the Beautiful Burial Grounds project. This means that you can photograph an object you have observed and with a few more clicks you can submit it straight to the project. This enables the experts to verify more accurately

what you have seen.

We would like to make this a family occasion and have chosen the time for our count as: Sunday 8<sup>th</sup> June 12-2.30 pm.

**Pews to Chairs at St John's Church -** The Chancellor has granted our Faculty but stipulated all-timber chairs. These are expensive; difficult to stack & store; and we could only fit 4 chairs to a row, thereby losing seating capacity. There was a selection of 5 smaller, wooden laminate chairs, with metal frames, for those attending the APCM to try, and indicate their preference. The majority vote was for the 'Durham' chair (£155 each). The PCC subsequently agreed we would seek permission from the Chancellor to purchase these, instead of all-timber chairs.

**New Life Among the Young -** Exciting signs of new life have been *Ignite*, our new children's group, and our **Young Adults** group. I am deeply grateful to the leaders and volunteers whose dedication makes this possible.

**Deepening Discipleship:** 2 new home groups launched this year, creating precious midweek spaces for deeper connection. Home groups are more than Bible study, they are places of belonging, prayer, and spiritual growth. If you aren't part of one yet, I encourage you to consider it.

**Safeguarding: At the Heart of All We Do -** A special thanks to Sue and the safeguarding team. Safeguarding is much more than policy; it's a culture of care, dignity, and trust which ensures that everyone - especially the most vulnerable - finds safety and respect in our church.

**Buildings with Open Doors -** Permission to remove pews at **St John's** is a step towards a more flexible, welcoming, creative space for worship, hospitality and community events. We are exploring how to develop St John's church hall. At **St Boniface**, preparations are underway for internal decoration and steeple restoration.

**The Men's Shed: Building More than Just Woodwork** - Our growing relationship with the *Men's Shed* at St Boniface, has been an unexpected blessing. This group offers more than practical skills, it offers friendship, purpose, and a safe space for men to find community and care.

Vision & Values - At the heart of these developments is our vision: Loving Jesus, loving one another, loving our community. A core principle emerging is building a community where no one is left behind. We want everyone to find a place of belonging, service, and purpose here. Are we truly inclusive? Are we making space for everyone's gifts? Are we reaching out to the forgotten?

**Looking Ahead with Hope** - We remain a church in transition: discerning, learning, growing. We are moving forward steadily, with faith and trust in God's leading. In the year ahead, I believe God is calling us to deepen our discipleship through prayer, widen our welcome, and step out more boldly in mission. I invite you to be part of this journey, to bring your prayers, your gifts, your ideas, your presence. Christ has called us together for such a time as this.

# May's Marvellous Litter Pick

It was great to see so many new faces at this month's litter pick. I counted 17 of us, which is an amazing turnout this bank holiday weekend.

Some picked around Tanglewood Lake, a beautiful, tranquil little lake, tucked away off Bakers Drove. Others tackled Bakers Drove, from Fairway Gardens up to the school. It was encouraging to find very little litter around the lake itself. I couldn't safely reach a ball floating on some pond weed! By the end of the hour we had collected 3 bags of general rubbish and 3 of recyclables, down from previous picks and so really encouraging to see.

A gentle reminder for everyone to carefully assess whether it's safe to go into brambles to pick. Also, please wear suitable clothing and gloves to protect yourselves and stay with at least one other person in case of emergency. Do let me know if you have any injuries during the litter pick. I have a first aid kit and am first aid trained.

After some discussions about where to meet for next month's litter pick, I think we shall meet Saturday 7<sup>th</sup> June at 10am at the end of Redbridge Lane, by the T-junction of Frogmore Lane and Yewtree Lane. There are a few parking spaces there. I look forward to seeing as many of you there as possible!

Recycling the items below via St John's Church mini-recycling centre can generate funds for various charities:




- used postage stamps, ideally with a 1cm margin
- old spectacles, (not cases or contact lenses).
- used printer cartridges and new unopened printer cartridges (not laser or toner cartridges)

We are no longer able to recycle used plastic pens and felt tips. And, for the time being, we cannot accept milk bottle tops. However Test Valley will now accept bottle tops in your kerbside recycling bin, if they are put back on the plastic bottle after it has been squashed.



Thanks to everyone who helps us recycle. The ink cartridge recycling not only means that waste is kept out of landfill, it also raises money for our churches. The last batch sent off raised £19.50. So far, we have raised about **£460** since we started collecting them.



Our livestreamed worship is primarily via our <u>YouTube</u> channel. Tea and coffee are served after the 10am service. There is a crèche area available during services at St John's Church. We hope to provide Prayer Ministry at 10am services.

# Pope Francis & Pope Leo XIV

(statements from the Archbishop of York)

#### "Let us walk together, work together, pray together."

These are the words Pope Francis said to me when we met in 2023. They sum up his vision for the church.

Francis's whole life and ministry was centred on Jesus who comes among us, not to be served, but to serve. We saw that in Francis's service of the poor, his love of neighbour especially the displaced, migrant, the asylum seeker, his deep compassion for the well-being of the earth and his desire to build the church in new ways. Francis showed us how to follow Jesus, and encouraged us to go and do likewise.

His encyclicals and teachings were supported by his deeds and actions. His whole life was instantly recognisable as those of one who followed Jesus. Pope Francis was acutely aware of the divisions between our churches, and I remember the powerful work he did with the then Archbishop of Canterbury, Justin Welby, and the Moderator of the Church of Scotland in promoting peacebuilding in South Sudan.

I remember, in the brief times I spent with him, how this holy man of God was also witty, lively, good to be with, and the warmth of his personality and interest in others shone out from him. May he rest in peace and rise in glory.

I share in the great joy of our Roman Catholic sisters and brothers in welcoming His Holiness Pope Leo XIV as the Bishop of Rome. With Christians around the world, I will be praying for the new Pope as he takes on the enormous challenges and responsibilities of the Petrine ministry.

Pope Leo XIV's many years of pastoral experience, his commitment to justice, and his deep spirituality are an example of life lived in service to Jesus Christ. As Anglicans we give thanks for his call to Christians to be bridge-builders across the divisions of our world, and the divisions that continue to exist between churches. This is something Jesus asks of us. He prays that the church will be one.

This evening, the new Pope spoke of a Church that seeks peace and remains close to those who suffer. Our wounded world needs the justice, healing and hope of Jesus Christ, and we look forward to working with Pope Leo XIV and Roman Catholics in every place to share that love with those in need.'

I pray that God's sustaining Spirit will uphold the new Pope in his service of Christ.'





Continue praying for peace where there is conflict. Pray for protection of civilians. Pray for wisdom for all those trying to find peaceful solutions and that the perpetrators would come to desire an end to conflict too. Pray for the victims of war; that they might have the aid they need and healing from the trauma they have suffered.

Give thanks for the congregation at St Boniface Church. Give thanks too for the work of the Friday gang, looking after the building and churchyard and preparing flowers. Pray for John, the warden, and all those who support the church.

Pray for the A Rocha project, Wolf Fields, in Southall. Give thanks that the nature reserve, formerly a rubbish dump, is now the centre of community activities and events. Pray that as local people come and enjoy being in nature they would come to see the love of God through His creation. Pray for those referred by local GPs to take part in activities that can improve their health, wellbeing and social welfare.
