

Dear Friends,

As we step into August and the heart of summer, I hope this season brings some rest and renewal for you. Whether you're enjoying a holiday, catching up with friends, or simply pausing in the slower rhythm of the month, I pray that these quieter days offer space for reflection, joy, and fresh perspective.

The change of pace summer brings is also a good moment to stop and give thanks. One of the things I've been especially grateful for recently is the extraordinary dedication of our volunteers. So much of what makes our churches vibrant, welcoming, and alive happens because of you.

From setting up for worship, reading, playing music, and arranging flowers, to preparing refreshments, maintaining the churchyard, and supporting our youth and children's groups and much more - you are the heartbeat of our community. Without your quiet service and faithfulness, the church simply couldn't function. You live out our shared vision every day:

Loving Jesus, one another, and our community. Thank you.

It's with that deep gratitude that I offer a gentle invitation. Might this be the moment to explore whether there's a small way you could offer your time or gifts in a wider capacity?

We're especially looking for people to support our children, youth, and families' ministry. This doesn't require teaching experience, or any special skills - just a willingness to be present and positive. We're asking for just 90 minutes per term or every other term - perhaps helping at a Sunday group, a children's or youth club or tots. Every contribution matters and it's a joyful, rewarding part of our shared life.

We're also looking to form a small pastoral care team to help us support those in need within the congregation and the parish. This might involve occasional visits, phone calls, or offering a listening ear. If you have time, a compassionate heart, and feel this may be a way you could serve, please do speak to me.



Another area of church life we're excited about is our building. After much prayer and discernment, we have finally reached the end of the first faculty phase of reordering to replace pews in St John's with chairs. The chairs will allow our space to be more flexible and welcoming - for worship, recitals, community gatherings, and more. The Chancellor has formally approved the change, and we're now entering the next important stage: raising funds to pay for them.

We'll be inviting the congregation to sponsor chairs - perhaps in memory of a loved one - or to contribute generally. Every gift, large or small, will help us move forward together. More information on how to give will be shared shortly.

We're also offering the opportunity to purchase a pew. For many people, these pews hold memories of baptisms, weddings, and loved ones. We want to honour that. If you'd like to keep a pew at home, or in a meaningful place, we'd love to make that possible. We're currently working with the Men's Shed to explore ways of shortening and refurbishing pews to make them more manageable and suitable for domestic use. If this is something you'd be interested in, please let us know.

In our most recent PCC meeting, we also spent valuable time discussing something that underpins all we do: safeguarding.

The protection of children, young people, and vulnerable adults is not just a legal responsibility - it's a spiritual and moral commitment. We reflected on how safeguarding is everyone's responsibility, and how crucial it is that our culture continues to be one of openness, attentiveness, and care.



We reviewed policies, procedures, and also practical aspects like safer recruitment and training. We asked ourselves:

- Are we doing enough to make people feel safe?
- Are our groups and gatherings spaces where people can speak up if something doesn't feel right?

I'm encouraged by the seriousness with which the PCC engaged in these conversations, and by our shared desire to keep improving.

So, let me say again: if you ever have a concern or need to talk about a safeguarding issue - no matter how small it may seem - please don't hesitate to speak to me, or to our Safeguarding Lead, Sue Muldowney. We're here to listen, respond, and ensure that every person in our church feels safe, heard, and valued.

At the heart of all of this - our volunteering, our building plans, our pastoral work and safeguarding - is a shared calling. A calling to love, to serve, and to build a church where all can belong.

The words of 1 Peter 4:10 speak powerfully into this:

"Each of you should use whatever gift you have received to serve others, as faithful stewards of God's grace in its various forms."

That's really what church is about. It's not about perfection or pressure: it's about all of us bringing what we have, however small, and watching how God uses it for something far bigger than ourselves.

So, this summer, I invite you to rest. To give thanks. To pray. And to consider if there might be a small way you can help us continue to love Jesus, one another, and our community - whether through time, prayer, financial support, or simply showing up.

Thank you for being part of this church. I'm so grateful for all we share - and excited for what lies ahead.

Remembering Peter Jackson A much-loved member of our parish community

Peter Jackson, who passed away earlier this year, was a devoted husband, father, grandfather, and a cherished member of the Nursling and Rownhams community. Known for his broad smile, infectious laugh, and generous spirit, Peter touched many lives through his kindness, energy, and faith.

Peter's Christian faith guided everything he did. He lived a life of service to his family, his profession, and his church. At Rownhams Church, he served faithfully as Gift Aid Secretary and was a school governor at Nursling Primary, eventually becoming Chair of Governors. After moving to Romsey in 2017, he joined the leadership team at Romsey Methodist Church and became a trustee at the Oasis Bookshop.

Peter had a distinguished career in medical physics, becoming Head of Medical Physics at Southampton General Hospital and later President of the Institute of Physics and Engineering in Medicine. Despite the demands of work, he always made time for family and community.

He also had many hobbies: cycling, sailing at Chew Valley and later Poole, ballroom and Latin dancing with his wife, and running in his later years. Whatever Peter did, he threw himself into it with enthusiasm and joy.

Peter will be remembered for his warmth, his wisdom, and the quiet way he gave of himself to others. His legacy lives on in the lives he shaped and the love he shared.

The Barty Hardship Scheme - Offering Hope in Times of Need

I'm writing to share an important and exciting new initiative in our church: **The Barty Hardship Scheme** is an emergency support fund designed to offer practical help to people facing short-term financial hardship.

This scheme is inspired by the story of Bartimaeus, the blind man who sat by the roadside and cried out to Jesus, 'Son of David, have mercy on me!' (Mark 10:47). Jesus didn't ignore him. He stopped, called him near, and asked the simple but profound question: 'What do you want me to do for you?'

It's this moment – full of compassion, dignity, and divine attention – that lies at the heart of the Barty hardship Scheme. It invites us, as the Body of Christ, to hear the cries of those around us and to respond not with judgement or distance, but with love, generosity, and practical care.

As a church, our vision is clear: **to love Jesus, one another, and our community**. And one of our core values is transforming hospitality: offering welcome and care that reflects God's heart and changes lives. The Barty Scheme is a way we live that vision out.



This emergency support fund will be overseen by the Vicar and Churchwardens, and used to assist people in urgent financial need. It could mean helping someone who's facing homelessness find safe shelter for a few nights. It might support a local family struggling to pay a utility bill or put food on the table. It could provide travel for someone attending medical appointments, to support counselling for mental health issues, or perhaps temporary help during an unexpected crisis.

We know these needs exist – not just 'out there', but among us and around us. And when someone reaches out and says, in their own way, 'Can you help me?' – we want to be a church that says yes.

We're inviting everyone in our church family to consider giving to the Barty Scheme – either through a one-time donation or by including it in your regular giving. It is a practical way to be part of something deeply spiritual: helping carry one another's burdens and sharing the love of Christ in action. This is not charity at a distance, it is hospitality that transforms. It is the church being the church.

Jesus met Bartimaeus' cry not with a lecture or delay, but with presence and power. Let us do the same. Let us be a people who respond with compassion, generosity, and courage when others fall on hard times.

Act Now Change Forever - 9th July

Well I went to the mass lobby that I mentioned last month and saw Caroline

Nokes and the photo is here to prove it!

I had attended some training and learned that I didn't have to be an expert. All I had to do was to tell her why I cared about Climate Change and Biodiversity loss and then talk about the ideas suggested by the lobby organisers.

The reason I care isn't just that, as Christians we are meant to be good stewards of God's creation, but firstly because I have been a Tearfund supporter for many years and it was probably at least 30 years ago when they started writing about how Climate Change was reversing the progress they had seen in developing countries.



I had worked out what I was going to say but had hoped that perhaps I wouldn't have to say anything! Looking on the Climate Change website it looked as if there were 4 of us registered and I hoped someone else would offer to be the spokesperson. However I was dismayed to learn that I was actually the only one who had finally committed to going so it was all up to me.

There were 3 others sitting with Caroline when I arrived and I felt very outnumbered. Fortunately, 2 of them then moved away a little so I was only talking to Caroline and an assistant. I'm guessing the others were people who knew about the subject matter so they could be called on if necessary to check facts. The other possibility is that they were watching closely to check I didn't take out a weapon!

I was surprised but pleased to discover that Caroline Nokes is now very much on board about the dangers of Climate Change and Biodiversity loss. She made the point, before I did, that they were in fact a greater threat than potential war. She also made the point before I did that it wasn't fair that the people who had done the least to cause Climate Change, were suffering the most.

As Deputy Speaker, she isn't allowed to vote or speak up on issues, but she can write to a minister and is taken more seriously than a back bencher would be. It has been shown that spending 20 minutes a day in nature is very good for our mental health, and she had already written to the Minister of Health suggesting GPs be encouraged to prescribe this to patients.

After my meeting with Caroline I went to the lobby hub, the QEII building. The various organisations that were part of the climate coalition had stalls. I spoke to the Tearfund representatives, and they were encouraged to learn that it was reading Teartimes that started me on this journey. There were various speakers too and I heard from someone who had been 13 when she first met her MP and managed to change his mind on the issue of hunting!

WWF had organised nature walks, and I attended one of these. We went to St James' Park and I learned a bit about the history of the park and some of the trees there. Apparently, it was originally the site of a hospital for people with leprosy. Then Henry VIII converted it to a deer park so he could hunt. James I improved the drainage and then kept a collection of various wild animals there. These were later moved to what became London Zoo.


There is still a variety of birds there. We were fortunate enough to see all 5 pelicans that live in the park before we left, and I went to catch a train home.

Recycling the items below via St John's Church mini-recycling centre can generate funds for various charities:



- used postage stamps, ideally with a 1cm margin
- old spectacles, (not cases or contact lenses).





We are no longer able to recycle used plastic pens and felt tips. And, for the time being, we cannot accept milk bottle tops. However Test Valley will now accept bottle tops in your kerbside recycling bin, if they are put back on the plastic bottle after it has been squashed.

Thanks to everyone who helps us recycle. The ink cartridge recycling not only means that waste is kept out of landfill, it also raises money for our churches. The last batch sent off raised £35.35. So far, we have raised about £600 since we started collecting them.

July's Litter Pick



Firstly, thank you to those who came along to June's litter pick, as they didn't hear that it was cancelled in anticipation of the stormy weather. In July we met at the same place, at the cross-road where Redbridge Lane meets Frogmore Lane.

There are hidden, but much needed, ditches along Frogmore Lane, which harboured lots of surprises. The brambles concealed the usual plastic and glass bottles, food wrappers and a full packet of crisps (we didn't open it!). We collected 3 bags of general waste and 3 bags of recyclable plastic, aluminium cans and glass.

Next month we will meet on Saturday 2nd August at 10am in the Joe Bigwood Close carpark by the social club. This way we can tackle the skatepark, playground and surrounding woods at the start of the summer holidays. **Sophie Ross**

Praying

During the latest Alpha course various groups have been praying while the sessions were happening. The difference this has made has been described as 'tangible'. So can I encourage you to pray while the Holiday Club sessions are in progress: This will be $4^{th}-6^{th}$ August, between 9am and 12 noon. Just chat to the Lord about



what you'd like to see going on there – and for good weather too!

House groups regularly report answers to prayer – it's a relaxed safe place to share what's bothering us, and to ask God for help. Do consider joining a group if you aren't in one already (please see page 2 of this magazine, or get in touch with the office: office:twinspires@gmail.com).

There is also the monthly Prayer Meeting in St John's at 6.30pm on the third Sunday of the month. Another opportunity to pray with others is at 2.15pm on the first and third Friday of each month at my home. (info from the office and do check the website/news sheet for any changes) These meetings usually last for about an hour and can cover any and every topic we want to bring to the Lord, and ask for the Holy Spirit's guidance.

We can talk to God about anything – He knows it all already, and loves to hear our prayers, and to be involved in our lives. We don't need a special place or special words – just like talking to a friend. He's interested in the little details of our lives as well as the big spiritual issues. As we bring more things to God, we become more aware of what He is doing in our lives, how He is answering our prayers. Often, He leaves the answers to the very last minute or waits for us to take the first step ourselves, in order to increase our faith.

If you would like someone else to pray for you, there is usually Prayer Ministry after the morning service at St John's. This is totally confidential, and isn't restricted to a one-off, since Jesus tells us to be persistent in our prayers. There are regular healing services too where anointing with oil may take place (see website for details). The next one will be at 10am on 31st August. Jesus wants to lift our burdens whatever they look like, so do let Him come and meet with you.

Boniface Bike Ride 2025

Our 2025 Boniface Bike Ride was a repeat of the 2012 ride from Hook of Holland to Fulda

In June Andy, Jacob, Mike & Maria cycled, unsupported, the 368 miles over 7½ days.

It was a challenging ride, both with the length and the hot weather we experienced on some days. We had no punctures and just one pannier problem during the trip.

Our arrival in Fulda coincided with the biennial cycle and



walking pilgrimage with around 300 attendees. See below individual reflections from each of the members.

Andy - Cycling in the Netherlands is just a delight and Germany was good too. The flatlands help you settle into the saddle ready for the more undulating landscapes ahead. As with the last visit, it was cooler and wetter in the mountains. The electric storm above our heads as we left Arnsberg and several roads turning into fast flowing rivers were particularly "exciting" moments.

God's timing and provision continue to be mind-blowing: eg there was chaos at Utrecht where trains were being cancelled and moved between platforms due to the Amsterdam line being closed, trains were literally rammed full, when an empty train right next to us was allocated to our destination and had 4 bike spaces together free.

For me, the peace of cycling by the big rivers and the German fields of cereal crops on cycle tracks or quiet roads was particularly tranquil. Cycling through forests was very helpful on hot days. The event in Fulda and the kind efforts made by many people to talk with us and show interest in what we were doing were very encouraging.

The cathedral in Fulda is an incredible place of worship and in spite of the language barrier I felt a great sense of God's presence as we worshiped there. The long days in the sun felt more draining than the actual cycling and by the end of the day I was pining for a cold drink and a rest before tackling the evening.

Teamwork definitely helped. Mike packing a kettle, which the accommodation often doesn't have, was a real treat. That Mike had booked good accommodation and planned excellent routes with David was brilliant. Maria's kindness and German speaking were super helpful and Jacob's keen eye, ready to push on, "in the right direction" and fitness, were great assets, as was starting the day with a time of prayer, which reminded me we were doing a pilgrimage, not just a bike ride. Mike and Maria's willingness to take on this ride is inspiring. And of course, that with the help of our generous sponsors we raised over £2,000 for CMS is a wonderful topper to this special ride.

Jacob - Having not completed this ride with the group before, I had been looking forward to travelling to this part of the history of St Boniface. I found the cycling very enjoyable in both countries. The views particularly in the sections of rolling hills in Germany were incredible, as was the engineering on display. It was a wonderful piece of God's timing that there was a family pilgrimage to the cathedral on the day that we had planned to arrive, and the event was wonderful. I spoke to a lady who had visited St. Boniface church in Nursling in the past and was interested in our pilgrimage.

I was particularly grateful to Maria for her translation, as I spoke almost no words of German before entering the country, and to Mike and my Dad for directing us throughout the long days of cycling in the heat.

Mike - It was a blessing to be able to complete this ride a second time, and with no knee problems this time. It was very challenging at times, but to have 3 other team members to encourage you really helps. We passed through some wonderful countryside and met many who were interested in what we were doing. It always amazes me the distances travelled by Boniface and others like him to spread the message of Jesus. My highlights were - the amazing cycle provision in both Holland & Germany; sleeping for up 10 hours some nights with that exhausted feeling and waking refreshed for another day; cream to relieve saddle soreness; the downhill from Winterburg (15km with little pedalling); the view from above Lauterbach towards Fulda and the Black Forest; the wonderful reception from the Fulda pilgrimage people; cold beers after a hot day cycling. In summary a memorable trip as all our Boniface rides have been and yes, I would do it again.

Maria - I was very pleased with the bike ride, so glad I did it! I was also glad when I had finished phew!! We had stunning weather and great accommodation every night - I very much appreciated that. Overall, the cycling was fairly flat. Winterberg was a ski resort I used the train for part of the long uphill, and where possible to shorten some of the other days. The boys were very supportive as I had not cycled long distances for 2 years. It all went very well.

Highlights from the PCC Meeting (7th July 2025)

Finance

'Funny Money' – donations of foreign currency and out of circulation UK currency totalled **£296** since January.

Policies

The following policies were reviewed and approved:

Reserves & Investment * Conflict of Interest * Legacy Policy *

St Boniface Church

- An estimated £12,000 of urgent electrical works is needed to make the church building safe.
- A survey of the dangerous Cedar of Lebanon tree in the churchyard estimated a cost of £20,000 to remove all limbs. Advice and approval will be sought from TVBC.
- SSEN will be carrying out safety work in the churchyard regarding cables in trees.
- The cost of £20,000 to extend the car park is prohibitive. An intermediate solution of laying plastic grids, to enable extra parking on the grass when needed, will be investigated.

St John's Church

- The Chancellor has approved the purchase of the 'Durham' wood laminate chairs, with metal frame, in Beech colour, to replace the pews. Funding needs to be raised for the estimated cost of £30,000 for chairs and storage dollies. Cushions may also be needed.
- Our grateful thanks go to a church in Eastleigh who have donated a considerable amount of good quality audio system equipment, which will provide us with a digital system.
- More volunteers are urgently needed to help with the Children's & Youth Groups, as well as for our Holiday Club, running 4th - 6th August.

Remembrance Day Soldier Silhouettes & World War II Plaque

The Men's Shed will be asked to produce two metal soldier silhouettes to stand outside each church building on Remembrance Sunday. They have offered to make a small commemorative plaque for St John's Church. (St Boniface Church already have names displayed for both World Wars.)

It can feel overwhelming, and we want to bury our heads in the sand, rather than build sandcastles on the beach.




