

Verse of the Month

Those beautiful words from one of my favourite Christmas carols by Christina Rossetti 'Love came down at Christmas' capture so simply what this season is all about. As the nights draw in and Advent approaches, we are reminded that Christmas begins not in noise or grandeur, but in love: the love of God made flesh in Jesus Christ, and the love that flows from Him into our lives, our relationships, and our community.

In a world that can so often feel hurried, fractured, or uncertain, these words call us back to what truly matters:

loving Jesus, loving one another, and loving our community.

Loving Jesus

At the heart of Christmas is not the tree, the lights, or even the gifts - it is a child, born in Bethlehem, who reveals the heart of God. In Jesus, love comes close. He steps into our world, not as a distant idea, but as one of us; sharing our humanity, our joys, and our sorrows.

Advent invites us to pause, to watch, and to wait. Amidst the bustle of the season, may we find moments of stillness to draw near to Him in prayer and Scripture. Loving Jesus means making room for Him in our hearts, homes, and choices. As we light our Advent candles, we remember again that His light shines in the darkness - and the darkness has not overcome it.

Loving One Another

Christmas reminds us that love overflows. The love we receive from Christ cannot stop with us - it moves outward, shaping our life together as a church family. "We love because He first loved us," writes St John, and that love is shown not just in words, but in care, patience, forgiveness, and joy.

Let's be mindful of those for whom this season may be difficult - those missing loved ones, those struggling with loneliness, or those weighed down by life's pressures. Sometimes, a small act of kindness - a card, a call, a quiet prayer - is the way Christ's love touches another heart.

Loving Our Community

Our mission as the Church is not only to gather but to go - to share the love of Jesus with our neighbours in both word and action. This year we've seen that love in so many ways: through our Summer Fayre's, the joyful Light Party, and the Giving Day, where the generosity of both our congregations was overwhelming. Each of these moments has been a sign of God's grace at work among us.

At St John's Church, the transformation of our hospitality space and the replacement of pews with chairs will open up new ways to welcome and serve. It has been a real expression of love in action, creating room for community, conversation, and fellowship. At St Boniface Church the new electrical work may be less visible, but it is no less vital - keeping us safe and ensuring our buildings remain places of light and warmth for all who enter.

These practical projects, alongside our worship and outreach, remind us that God's love is both spiritual and tangible - made real whenever His people come together with willing hearts.

A Word of Thanks

As the year draws to a close, I want to say a heartfelt *thank you* to everyone who gives so much of themselves to our church life. To every volunteer - from those who make tea and arrange flowers, to those who read, sing, clean, garden, serve on the PCC, visit the sick, and pray quietly at home - *thank you*. You are the living heartbeat of our parish.

Your faithfulness reflects the truth that we are one body with many parts, each playing a precious role in God's work among us. As Paul writes,

"Just as each of us has one body with many members, and these members do not all have the same function, so in Christ we, though many, form one body, and each member belongs to all the others." (Romans 12:4–5)

Looking Ahead

As we step into Advent and look toward Christmas, may Rossetti's words guide us once again: "Love shall be our token."

Let love be the sign of our life together - love for Jesus, love for one another, and love for our community. And as we continue to "muck in" and share the load - each offering what we can, in time, prayer, or service - may we remember the encouragement of Scripture:



"Each of you should use whatever gift you have received to serve others, as faithful stewards of God's grace in its various forms." (1 Peter 4:10)

So, let us go forward into Christmas and the new year with thankful hearts, serving together in love, and shining the light of Christ wherever He calls us to be.

A blessed Advent and joyful Christmas to you all. May the peace of Christ dwell richly in your homes and hearts this season and always.

Church Christmas Cards

As in previous years, for our church family, we plan to produce an oversized Christmas card for each Church, so we can exchange seasonal greetings. As well as saving resources, this means that there is no risk of cards being missed in Church, or accidently omitting to prepare a card for anyone in particular.

This year, our giant cards are being made by the Ichthians. One card will be placed in each church on Advent Sunday (30th Nov) and the church family encouraged to sign with a small greeting. Between the 2nd and 3rd Sunday of Advent (7th and 14th Dec) the two cards are swapped over, with our church family signing the other card. Then, before Christmas Eve the cards are once again swapped over, so all can see the greetings. Please note, a donation box will be available alongside the Christmas cards.

Christmas Cards - What to Do?

It's that time of year when we think about Christmas cards. By some they are viewed with pleasure, by others another task to do when they are busy enough already - but nowadays the ridiculously high price of the stamps is putting many folk off posting these. It's a shame really, because many of us like to keep in touch with friends and family. However, the wastage involved in using so much card to produce these and fuel to deliver is not a bad thing to cut down on.

I wrote about this last year and that E-cards can be a good alternative. Admittedly not everyone has a computer or uses email - but most folks these days do and so it is possible to send Ecards to most of your friends and relatives and use land mail for just a small number - or perhaps ring them and have a chat instead.

I personally use: **DontSendMeACard.com** (DSMAC), and support Southampton Mencap. DSMAC invites people to make a donation to a charity. There are over 2000 to choose from and for your donation you get 100 Ecards.

You may donate as little as £2, to as much as you wish. I think this is great because it allows people to keep in touch who may not be able to afford to do so otherwise. It also allows those who can afford to be generous, to give as much as they wish to a worthy cause.

Maybe you are also involved with a charity? It's probably a bit late for this year now, but you could suggest that your charity registers with DSMAC.

I did this with Southampton Mencap last year and also supplied them with some designs using my art work.


Street Pastors Clothing Appeal

I have one special request. When you choose what to give, please take time to imagine Christmas morning and what a child's reaction will be to your gift. Joy? Excitement? Or will it be disappointment because you've given a dirty, broken toy, a book with another child's name written in or a puzzle missing some of its pieces.

Now, I have to add that those kinds of gifts get filtered out by SCRATCH volunteers before they even reach a child, but they can represent up to 20% of what we get donated. I know that, because I'm one of the people who does the sifting, and many items given by churches have gone to charity shops (or straight into the bin if they're too awful) over the past few years.

Brand new toys are always preferred (as they will be by the children who receive them) but if you have second hand books/cuddlies/games, please make sure they would be good enough for your child or grandchild or friend's child to open on the big day. *Many thanks*Ann Laird

And There Were Shepherds

Luke's story of the birth of Jesus is brilliantly told – the angel's visit to Mary to tell her she would be mother of the long-promised Messiah, the old priest in the Temple told by another angel that his wife would have a son to be called 'John', who would prepare the people of Israel for that



event, and then Mary and Joseph making the 60 mile journey from Nazareth to Bethlehem, as required by the Roman census. When they got there, no room at the inn, and they settled instead for a convenient stable, where Mary gave birth to a boy child.



Suddenly, Luke changes the tone. 'And there were shepherds ...' – that's what he actually wrote, just like that. 'And there were shepherds', doing exactly what shepherds do, looking after their flocks by night. But this night was different: yet another angelic message – a call to abandon their sheep and go into Bethlehem to see the baby Messiah. They were given directions and a 'sign' to identify Him. He would be lying in a

feeding trough. Well, at least they would recognise that.

And why the shepherds, in this glorious story of our salvation? Because the event needed witnesses, and the chosen witnesses would be this bunch of scruffy, smelly shepherds straight from the sheep-pen. Nothing could speak more eloquently of God's purpose than that.

This was not a Saviour for the strong, rich and powerful, but for everybody. The carpenter and his wife guarded the Saviour of the world, and the very first witnesses were not kings or priests but a handful of shepherds.

10 Fun Facts about Christmas Trees

- Even before the time of Christ, evergreen trees were seen in winter as a symbol of fertility.
- It was the 16th century monk, Martin Luther, who is credited with the idea
 of having lights on Christmas trees. He added candles to his tree, to look
 like stars in a forest.
- Windsor Castle got its first Christmas tree in 1800, brought by Charlotte, wife of George III.
- It was in 1835 that the term 'Christmas tree' was first used in English.
- It was in the 1840s, when Prince Albert, consort of Queen Victoria, began bringing trees inside, that led to their popularity throughout the UK.
- Woolworths first sold manufactured Christmas tree ornaments in 1880.
- The tree in London's Trafalgar Square has been a gift from the city of Oslo, Norway since 1947.
- The world's tallest Christmas tree, at 221ft high, was erected in a Washington shopping mall in 1950.
- In a survey of the nation's favourite smells, real Christmas trees came eighth, just behind the sea, but ahead of perfume.
- About five million real Christmas trees are sold in the UK each year.

Attendance at Churches

Attendance at Church of England churches grew for the fourth year in a row last year, statistics have confirmed. The overall number of regular worshippers across the Church of England's congregations rose to 1.009 million in 2024, a rise of 0.6 per cent, according to the annual Statistics for Mission findings.

It was the second year in a row in which the Church of England's "worshipping community (the combined number of regular members of local congregations) has stood above a million since the Covid-19 pandemic. All age average attendance on a Sunday also rose 1.5 per cent to 581,000 in 2024, extending rises over recent years. Overall attendance across the week edged upwards by 1.6 cent in a year, at just over 702,000 last year, according to the figures.

The increase was driven by a recovery in attendance by adults (over 16), among whom average Sunday attendance was up by 1.8 per cent and weekly attendance rose by 1.8 per cent. The 2024 figures showed adult baptisms rose to 8,700 in 2024 (from 7,800 in 2023). There was a rise in the number of young people, aged 11-17 baptised, from 2,100 in 2023 to 2,400 last year. Confirmations also rose by 5.3 per cent from 10,700 to 11,300.

While the overall figures show that in-person attendance has not fully reached pre-pandemic levels, they do suggest it is moving closer to the projected pre-pandemic trend and in some cases has risen above the levels that might have been expected had there been no pandemic. **Parish Pump**

The Dictators of Russia & China Would Like to Live Forever

This month Christians worldwide welcome the Baby whose life and death and resurrection bring us eternal life. Meanwhile, it seems that Putin and Xi Jinping are wondering if they might achieve a bit of immortality without divine help.

In a recent meeting to attend the Beijing military parade, the dictators of Russia and China were caught on a hot mic discussing how it might be possible to live to be 150. Mr Xi, 72, told Putin: "These days, at 70 years you are still a child. Mr Putin, also 72, answered: "With biotechnology, human organs can be continuously transplanted, and now people can live younger and younger, and even achieve immortality."

It has been reported that Putin last year ordered scientists to look into '3D bioprinting' to use lab-grown cells to print replacement organs. Putin later confirmed the conversation, when questioned by reporters. "Yes, yes, modern means of healing, medicine, even all kinds of surgery related to organ replacement allow humanity to hope that active life will continue differently than it does today."

A hope that 'active life will continue differently than it does today'. Sounds a bit like the Christian hope of eternity! *Parish Pump*


