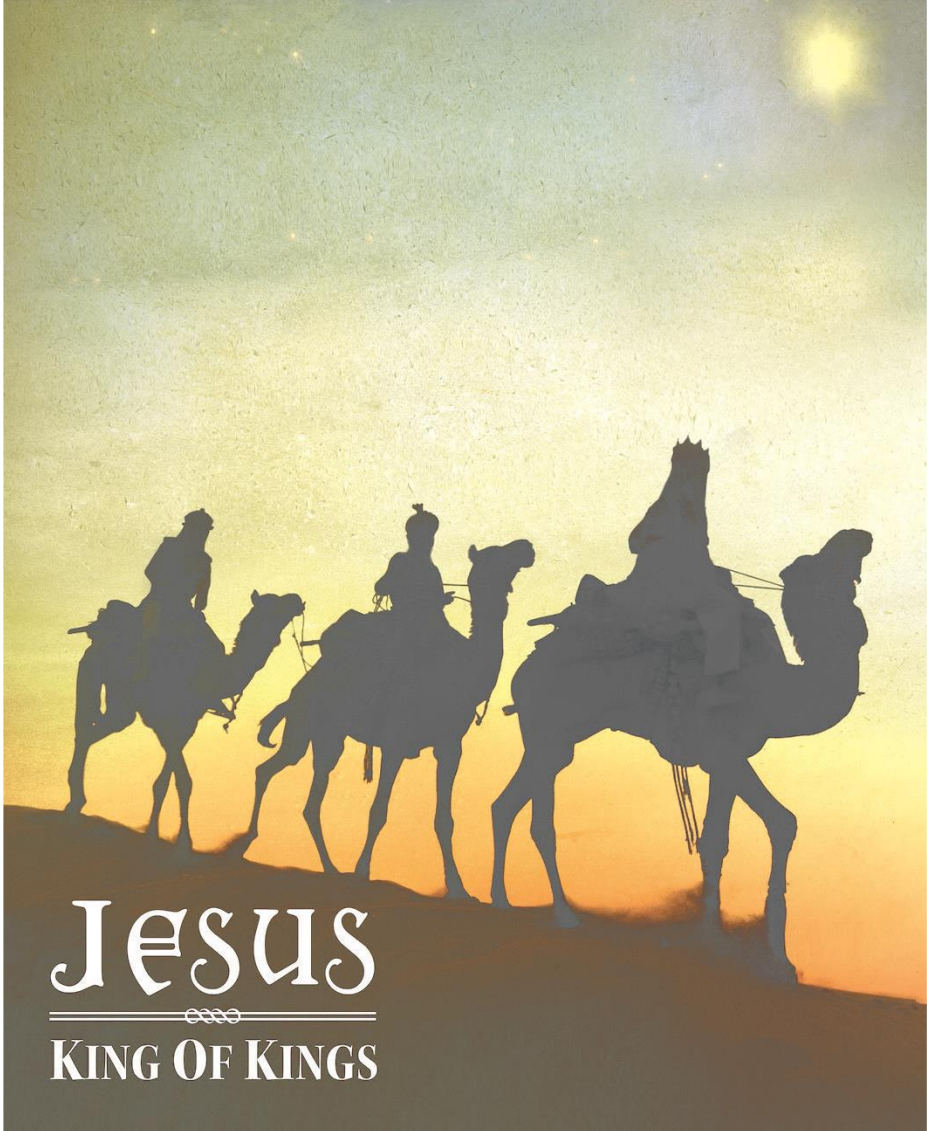

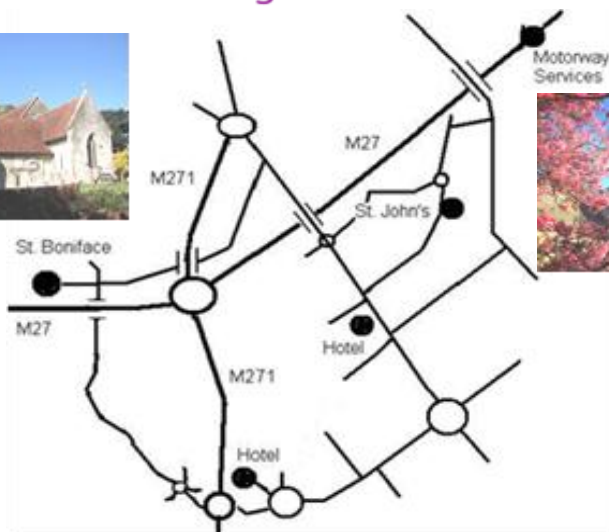

Verse of the Month

Dear friends,

As we step into a new year, we do so in the light of Epiphany—a season when God reveals who Jesus truly is. Epiphany invites us to look again, to pay attention, and to recognise the ways God is working among us as we begin 2026.



We start with the wise men – outsiders, travellers who followed a star they did not fully understand. They arrived with gifts whose meaning they themselves couldn't have grasped. Their story reminds us that God draws people from unexpected places, often long before they understand what is happening in their hearts. The strangers become guests; the guests become worshippers; and the worshippers become part of the unfolding story of God's love.

This speaks clearly into our vision: “Loving Jesus, one another, and our neighbours.” Epiphany invites us to look outward – to those who may be searching, questioning, or quietly longing for hope. And it especially encourages us to create space for them.

That's why the new chairs arriving at St John's are more than just furniture. They allow us to shape our space with greater flexibility – to gather around tables, pray in new ways, welcome community events, and create environments where seekers feel at ease. Like the stable that welcomed the wise men, the space we prepare can help others draw near to Christ. This year, let us ask: Who will God lead to us? Who are the outsiders or the curious ones He is already prompting toward faith? And how will we respond?

In that spirit, I am delighted that a new Alpha Course begins this January. Alpha provides a gentle, open way for people to explore the Christian faith – ideal for those who, like the wise men, are searching but may not yet know what they will find.



I encourage you to pray for Alpha, invite someone to come, or offer support in any way you can.

Epiphany also includes the moment when John the Baptist points to Jesus and says, “Behold, the Lamb of God, who takes away the sin of the world!” (John 1:29). John saw what others did not yet see. Helping people see Jesus clearly remains part of our mission: “to grow new disciples through community with Jesus at the centre.” Through welcome, worship, prayer, and friendship, we can be people who help others recognise the presence of Christ.

Yet even in this season of revealing, doubt still appears. Later, from prison, John sends word to Jesus asking, “Are you the one who is to come?” (Matthew 11:3). If John could question, so can we. Jesus answers him not with rebuke but with evidence of God at work – lives changed, hope restored. Epiphany reminds us to trust God’s work even when we cannot yet see the whole picture.

We also meet Simeon, who waited faithfully until the moment he could finally hold the Christ child and declare, “My eyes have seen your salvation.” Simeon teaches us patient, confident hope – trusting God’s promises even when the wait is long. That is a wonderful encouragement as we look ahead to the opportunities and challenges of the coming year.

There is also practical renewal happening in both our churches. At St John’s, the new chairs give us the flexibility to welcome more people, host new ministries, and adapt our worship as the Spirit leads. At St Boniface, electrical work, plaster repairs, and fresh paint will help ensure that our building continues to be a safe, warm, and beautiful place for worship and welcome. These practical acts of stewardship reflect our value of Purposeful Living – Giving, loving, inviting.



As this year begins, I want to encourage us to be a praying community. We should be praying as a matter of urgency – praying expectantly and persistently – as we wait for God to reveal His plans and purposes for us. This truly is a year of opportunity for both our churches.

At St John’s, prayer will help us discern how best to use our renewed space and how to embrace those God sends our way. At St Boniface, prayer will help us see beyond building work to the deeper work God is preparing to

do in the lives of His people. In both churches, let us ask: Lord, whom are You bringing to us? And how can we love them well?

As we journey through Epiphany, may our eyes be open like Simeon's, our hospitality wide like the stables, and our worship wholehearted like the wise men's. And may our prayers rise with urgency and trust as we seek God's will for the year ahead.

The Seven Deadly Sins: Pride

Our new series looks at the 7 Deadly Sins, a list compiled by Pope Gregory 1 in AD 590 to describe the nature of sin. This month we consider pride, *'the beginning of all sin'* (Augustine).

Pride is preoccupied with self and denies the need for others or God. We see it present in the first sin, when Adam and Eve wanted to become like God (Genesis 3:5).

What does pride look like? Jesus told the story of two men, a Pharisee and a tax collector, who went to pray in the Temple (Luke 18: 9-14). The Pharisee stood by himself and prayed: *'God, I thank you that I am not like other people, robbers, evildoers, adulterers, or even like this tax collector. I fast twice a week and give a tenth of all I get.'* (11,12). He illustrates how pride is essentially putting ourselves in God's place and believing we can run our own lives. It's subtle and self-deceptive and eats away our lives: *'Pride goes before destruction, a haughty spirit before a fall.'* (Proverbs 16:18).

So how do we deal with pride? The answer is humility. The tax collector stood at a distance *'he would not even look up to heaven, but beat his breast and said, 'God, have mercy on me, a sinner.'* (13). This man was right with God, because he acknowledged his sin and his need for forgiveness. Humility is being realistic about ourselves, and acknowledging our total dependence on God. We develop it by giving ourselves wholeheartedly to God and repenting of our desire to do things our way: *'Humble yourselves, therefore, under God's mighty hand, that he may lift you up.'* (1 Peter 5:6).

Nursling Men's Shed

Four mornings a week for men and Thursday afternoon for ladies

Here in Nursling & Rownhams we have a wonderful resource - the Nursling Men's Shed which is at St Boniface Church Hall. Nursling Men's Shed is part of UK Men's Sheds Association UKMSA and below is an explanation about what Sheds are like, taken from their website www.menssheds.org.uk



Men's sheds (or Sheds) are similar to garden sheds - a place to pursue practical interests at leisure, to practice skills and enjoy making and mending. The difference is that garden sheds and their activities are often solitary in nature while Men's Sheds are the opposite. They're about social connections and friendship building, sharing skills and knowledge, and of course a lot of laughter.

The Nursling Men's Shed is a wonderful friendly place and very well equipped too. It has a range of mechanical and hand tools, as well as lathes, pyrography equipment and a sewing machine. Sessions are Monday, Tuesday, Thursday and Friday mornings, and on Thursday afternoon a ladies session is held.

Perhaps you could be interested in taking up some new practical interests or developing DIY skills or want to fix/restore something but need a bit of help.

So how about trying something new in 2026? Perhaps pop in one day and see what goes on and meet a bunch of friendly people. The kettle is always on if you fancy a cuppa while visiting too.

Highlights from the PCC Meeting 18th November 2025

Safeguarding

The 'Appropriate Boundaries' document was discussed.

Health and Safety

The outside path around St John's Church is now fully lit at night. An additional light will be fitted to illuminate St John's Church carpark.

Policies

The following are being updated for review at the next PCC Meeting:

- ✓ N&R Complaints Policy

St Boniface

- ✓ **Men's Shed.** The new Agreement stated that no welding work could be undertaken, and therefore permission would not be granted to extend the temporary structure at the front of the Church Hall.
- ✓ **Lee Church Triptych.** The three solid panels, originally from Lee Church, had been in St Boniface Church loft for 40 years. They are now temporarily stood at the back of St Boniface Church. A decision needs to be made regarding their future. It is unlikely we would get permission for their permanent fixture because they are not part of St Boniface Church history.

St John's Church

- ✓ **Pews to Chairs.** The chairs will be picked up from the factory in Italy on 13/14 December and delivered to us a week later. To ensure we do not run out of seating for the Christmas services, any further pews sold cannot be collected until the New Year. It was suggested we source locally produced cushions, with the congregation being asked, for the short term, to bring their own, if required.
- ✓ **Church Hall.** This will be progressed in the New Year.

Vision and Values

Our new Vision Statement and Values were approved. It was agreed our new Vision Statement "Loving Jesus, one another, and our neighbours", would be displayed in both our churches; the monthly magazine, and included in Sunday preaching.

Like the early church, we believe disciples grow through shared life — learning, worshipping, serving, and supporting one another with Jesus at the heart.

What this looks like

- Gathering in worship to love Jesus and encourage one another.
- Building deeper relationships through small groups and prayer.
- Serving our community with kindness, hospitality, and creative outreach.
- Inviting others to explore faith through friendship and shared activities.

Our vision, values, and mission are more than statements — they express God’s call to love deeply, welcome generously, and live purposefully so that lives and communities may be transformed.

PRAYING OUR VISION INTO BEING

Loving Jesus, one another, and our neighbours

Prayer is at the heart of everything we aim to be and do as followers of Jesus, so here are some thoughts on how we can turn the words of our Vision into reality in our daily lives. 'We love each other because He loved us first' (1 John 4:19)

Loving Jesus

When we love someone, we want to spend time with them, so our prayer times become very important. We may not be able to be like Daniel and get down on our knees three times a day, or spend most of our time talking with God like Brother Lawrence, but we can make sure we set aside time for Jesus each day. Also if we are in a loving relationship we want to please the other person – that becomes a strong focus for what we do and say, a way of showing love towards them. In the same way, Jesus wants to spend time with us and to bless us. This results in each one of us being transformed by Jesus so that we are equipped for the tasks He is calling us into.

Loving one another

This includes all the people in our Christian family, whether they are known to us or not. As well as spending time together and trying to bring happiness to those we love – and this could be praying for and supporting Christians anywhere in the world - we can practise putting their needs first, seeking their wellbeing. In our churches we can grow together in our worship and through talking about what Jesus is doing in our lives. We can be comforters and encouragers in the daily ups and downs of life, often through sacrifice, as Jesus taught us, and always through prayer.

Loving our neighbours

This is loving and reaching out to those around us who don't yet recognise Jesus. Some we may know, others we look forward to meeting. So, we just aim to 'love one another' in mostly the same ways, especially by preparing the ground with our prayers. Jesus answers our prayers, and you may be surprised at the 'coincidences' you meet with when moving forward in obedience to His nudges. I've often been amazed how saying something very simple like 'have you tried praying?' opens into a really meaningful discussion. Of course, there are the more formal opportunities to bring the love of Jesus into our communities, like serving on the local Council, helping with a food bank etc – the possibilities are endless! Let's remember the parable Jesus told about the Good Samaritan.

Moving forward in prayer with faith will bless us with a foretaste of Heaven, as we see 'Your kingdom come' in this place and at this time.

Anglicans in Hong Kong offer prayers and support in aftermath of deadly fire

“Pray with us,” the Archbishop of Hong Kong, the Most Revd Andrew Chan, has asked, following a horrific fire in seven residential tower blocks in Wang Fuk Court, in Tai Po. At least 146 people were killed. The complex was home to about 4600 people, and in addition to those killed, dozens have been critically injured, and others are still missing.



Community organisations - including the Hong Kong Anglican Church, known as the Hong Kong Sheng Kung Hui (HKSKH) - have rallied to support those displaced by the fire. The HKSKH's Welfare Council has launched a disaster support fund, and an HKSKH church centre in Tai Po has been opened to provide a shelter for people now made homeless by the fire.

Archbishop Chan said: “As fellow children of God, even though we are separated by geographical distances, I ask of you to pray with us in Hong Kong for the mercy and love of our Lord”

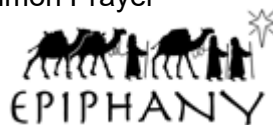

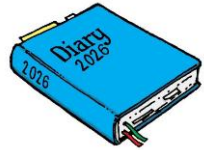

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Epiphany!

You probably know from tales of Greek mythology that gods and goddesses would often appear out of nowhere in ancient Greece to beguile or trick mortals. The word for this in everyday Greek was 'epiphany'; - the appearance or manifestation of a divine being on earth to humans. For Christians Epiphany is the season after the 12 days of Christmas.



Our Epiphany Bible readings tell of the 'manifestation' of Jesus to a wider audience than those in the Christmas stories. We mark this in the first instance by placing the Wise Men in the crib scene; they have now arrived to see the consummation of their hopes and travels. And our Epiphany readings usually continue through the season with Jesus' baptism; John the Baptist's witness to Christ, Jesus' family attempting to take charge of Him because of His popularity with the crowds, and the Presentation in the Temple. In all these, something of divine glory is being made manifest.

In more common parlance today, an epiphany means a sudden or blinding realisation ('I had a sudden epiphany that John was going to marry Celia'). That modern meaning is helpful; 'Gosh, epiphanies can be part of *our* Christian experience!' Remember that occasion we were so conscious of God's love holding us? Or the time we knew the words we used to that stranger were infused with a grace we didn't know we had? These and similar experiences which we've probably all had can be seen as *our* epiphanies- a time when God was made manifest to us (and possibly through us) in a distinct way.

Have you ever thought of those sorts of experiences as an epiphany? Not ring-fenced to a particular time of year, but part of our everyday experience, as we seek to live out our baptism promises, and follow Jesus through the ups and downs, the humdrum and the extraordinary, the joys and sorrows of the everyday.

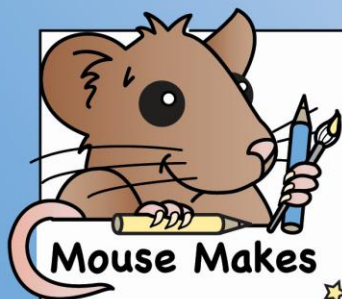

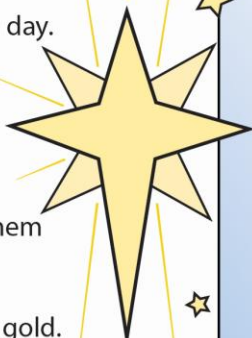
WISE MEN FROM THE EAST

The Blue Lamp Trust is a not-for-profit organisation operating across Hampshire and the Isle of Wight, dedicated to improving the safety, security and wellbeing of vulnerable, elderly and high-risk residents.

The Trust delivers two key charitable services:

- Safe Home – formerly The Bobby Scheme – providing free home safety and security visits for vulnerable residents, including victims of crime, domestic abuse, and those living alone.
- Safe Online – formerly Cyber Bobby – offering tailored digital safety guidance, scam awareness support and online protection advice for older and vulnerable people.

To help fund these essential community services, the Trust operates a national driver training programme through its commercial trading arm, Blue Lamp Trust (Services) Ltd, delivering accredited professional training to drivers, fleets, businesses and licensing authorities across the UK.

The Trust is proudly supported by local emergency services, and its Board of Trustees includes key leaders from Hampshire & Isle of Wight Constabulary and Hampshire & Isle of Wight Fire & Rescue Service.
